Reinventing Older Communities; Rebuilding Resilient Cities

The Federal Reserve Bank and several co-sponsors are holding a conference on the subject: "Reinventing Older Communities: Rebuilding Resilient Cities, from May 9th to May 11th at the Hyatt Regency Philadelphia, at Penn's Landing. U.S. HUD Secretary Saun Donovan and Harvard University Professor Edward Glaeser, will each give a keynote address. The co-sponsors include the Federal Reserve Banks of Boston, Chicago, Cleveland, New York, Richmond, St. Louis, the William Penn Foundation, Penn Institute for Urban Research, Ford Foundation, HUDs Office of Policy and Development & Research and the FHL Bank of Pittsburgh.

Residents Express Concerns About Neighborhood Improvement District

A large number of community residents came out to a meeting held at Temple University on Tuesday, March 6, 2012 and at a hearing at Philadelphia City Council on Tuesday, March 13, 2012 to express their concerns about creating a Neighborhood Improvement District (NID) in North Central Philadelphia. The proposed district would be located starting at York Street going south to Girard Avenue and Broad Street to 19th Street with several other areas east of Broad Street. All for-profit businesses and rental property owners would pay an additional tax for cleaning and basic services in the area.

Temple University and the student housing landlords proposed creation of the NID as a benefit to the community but most homeowners and local resident have stated that if any “Neighborhood” organization is to be created that the homeowners should be in control of the operations and decisions. Other residents and business owners complain that they already pay taxes and should not have to pay additional taxes for basic services.

The next public hearing will be on *May 3, 2012* at 9 a.m. City Hall Council Room 400.

New PA Voter ID Law Could Deny Some People the Right to Vote

Voters in Philadelphia and throughout PA will now be required to show a photo identification card each time they go to the polls to vote, as a result of a new law recently signed by Governor Corbett.

Although the law goes into effect, officially, for the election on November 6th, voters will be asked to produce a photo ID card in the upcoming April 24th, primary, but will not be prohibited from voting without one.

One of the major criticisms of this law, which is one of many throughout the country is that it is supposed to prevent voter fraud. Critics, which include most community activists, including the PA ACLU say there just isn’t much documentation or evidence of voter fraud. .

Community activists are educating voters about the photo ID cards that are acceptable by law. Also, certain government agencies are required to provide photo ID cards to those who can’t afford it.

Scholarship Opportunities

Beech Scholarship Fund will award \$1,000 scholarships to four qualifying high school seniors entering Temple University as a full-time freshman for the Fall 2012 academic year. The scholarships are in honor of Beech's founders, Dr. Bernard C. Watson, John C. Haas, F. Otto Haas and Floyd W. Alston.

This grant commitment from the Beech Scholarship Fund sets criteria that includes having a grade point average of 2.75 or higher and declaring a major in either *Arts, Business, Engineering or Education*. Students must be active in extra-curricular activities in their school, church or community. The scholarship submission deadline is Friday, May 11, 2012 and should be post-marked by midnight. The Ron Brown Scholar Program seeks to identify African-American high school seniors who will make significant contributions to society. Applicants must excel academically, exhibit exceptional leadership potential, participate in community service activities and demonstrate financial need. The applicant must be a US citizen or hold a permanent resident visa card. Current college students are not eligible to apply.

Each year, ten to twenty students will be designated Ron Brown Scholars and will receive \$10,000 annually for four years, for a total of \$40,000. The recipients may use the renewable scholarships to attend an accredited four-year college or university of their choice within the United States. Ron Brown Scholarships are not limited to any specific field or career objective and may be used to pursue any academic discipline. More than 250 students have been designated as Ron Brown Scholars since the inception of the Program. Ron Brown Scholars are selected in the spring prior to entering college. Applications are screened during the month of February by Ron Brown Scholar Program staff. In March, finalists are invited to participate in a weekend selection process in Washington, D.C. at the expense of the Ron Brown Scholar Fund. Finalists are interviewed by members of the Ron Brown Selection Committee and are expected to participate in several Selection Weekend activities.

Scholarship winners are selected on the basis of their applications, interviews and participation in Selection Weekend activities. Notification follows immediately.
